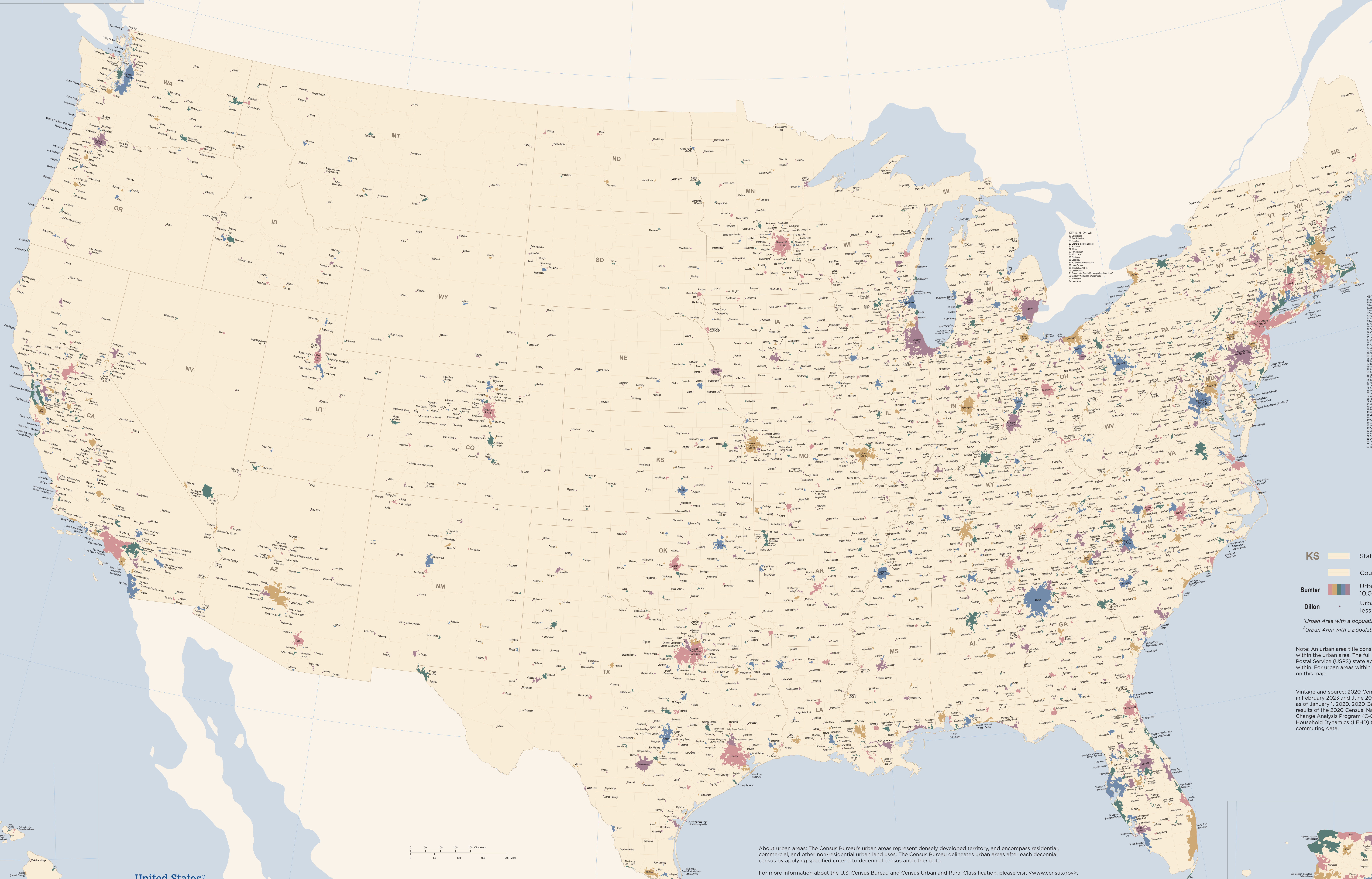


# 2020 Census Urban Areas of the United States and Puerto Rico

The full title also includes the two letter United States Postal Service (USPS) state abbreviation(s) of the state(s) the urban area is within. For urban areas within a single state, the state abbreviation is omitted on this map.

Vintage and source: 2020 Census Urban Areas reflect the corrections applied in February 2023 and June 2023. All other legal and statistical boundaries are as of January 1, 2020. 2020 Census Urban Areas are delineated based on the results of the 2020 Census, National Land Cover Database (NLCD) and Coastal Change Analysis Program (CC-CAP) land cover data, and Longitudinal Employer-Household Dynamics (LEHD) Origin-Destination Employment Statistics (LODES) commuting data.

About urban areas: The Census Bureau's urban areas represent densely developed territory, and encompass residential, commercial, and other non-residential urban land uses. The Census Bureau delineates urban areas after each decennial census by applying specified criteria to decennial census and other data.
